Brief course description	The Diploma in Tropical Medicine (DTM) is offered in a modular format comprised of four intensive modules and an optional hands-on lab practical. The course is hybrid providing students the opportunity to complete the course in-person or online. Students can take all modules in the same year or enroll in fewer modules per year. However, to earn the DTM, all four modules must be successfully completed within 36 months. Completion of this program will prepare health care professionals to sit for the American Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene (ASTMH) Certificate of Knowledge in Clinical Tropical Medicine and Travelers' Health (CTropMed®) Exam. A review session and study guide are provided for all students that complete the course prior to taking the CTropMed® exam (September/October annually).		This Diploma Course fulfills all American Society for Tropical Medicine and Hygiene (ASTMH) criteria for an approved Diploma Course in Clinical Tropical Medicine and Travelers' Health. Completion of this program will prepare individuals to sit for the ASTMH Certificate of Knowledge in Clinical Tropical Medicine and Traveler's Health CTropMed® Exam. The academic phase comprises 4 weeks (40 hours/week) of intensive instruction (160 didactic hours) covering the full CTropMed® Examination Content Outline, including infectious diseases, epidemiology, clinical syndromes, public health, and travelers' health. The curriculum includes 35 hours of laboratory instruction delivered by the BCM National School of Tropical Medicine, providing hands-on and/or virtual training in microscopy, specimen preparation, diagnostic interpretation, and organism identification consistent with ASTMH laboratory competencies. Faculty for the course will be comprised of highly-trained and experienced physicians and faculty with international experience. Following the academic phase, trainees complete one year of supervised clinical tropical medicine immersion at Texas Children's Global Health partner sites. Activities include inpatient and outpatient tropical medicine care, pediatric HIV care, laboratory diagnosis, and public health surveillance in alignment with ASTMH flexible hours requirements. Eligible learners include BCM Pediatrics/Global Health residents as part of their 4-year residency program and incoming Texas Children's Global Health Corps physicians.

Brief course description	The objective of the Diploma Course is to train physicians to be able to work in countries of the tropics or subtropics. The course is also intended to enable participants to diagnose and treat diseases in travellers and migrants from the tropics and subtropics and to provide preventive medical travel-related advice. The focus of the course is on the aetiology, epidemiology, clinical presentation, diagnosis and treatment of tropical diseases and clinical work in low resource settings. The curriculum also covers travel medicine and principles of global health. Curriculum: The course teaches the following knowledge and skills: • Epidemiology, diagnosis and treatment of tropical and travel associated diseases including bacterial, viral, mycotic and parasitic infections and venomous animal accidents. • Medical advice before travel and foreign assignments including prophylactic measures. • Principles of public health in low and middle income countries. • Principles of occupational health for travellers with long term stays. • Indications, proper sample collection and handling for laboratory examinations and classification of the results in the respective clinical profile. • Microscopic detection of protozoa, worms and parasites.		Given in Lima, Peru, this unique tropical medicine training initiative combines an international faculty with didactic and formal bedside teaching right in the tropics. Intensive diploma course in English with 380 contact hours: 160 formal lecture hours, plus diagnostic laboratory, daily ward rounds on a 36-bed tropical disease unit or daily out-patient clinic, and case conferences. Brief course description	Our programme raises awareness of global health concerns and allows students to identify and analyse key factors shaping the health and well-being of populations. As a multidisciplinary approach it combines public health, epidemiology, tropical medicine, economics and management sciences, among others. The course is concerned with topics such as health promotion and prevention, treatment of poverty-related diseases, rehabilitation, strengthening health systems and informing health policy. The Diploma consists of a 13 week Core Course plus two advanced modules: Parasitology in International Health and Clinical Management of Tropical Diseases.			This postgraduate certificate programme consists of three short courses: Research Approaches in International Health (one month, Sept, English only) This is an introductory course to research approaches in international health. It covers different research disciplines, including epidemiology and statistics, social sciences, and implementation research. It prepares the participant to recognise, appraise and use a variety of health research methods, both quantitative and qualitative. Challenges in International Health (three months: Oct- Dec English, March-June French) This 12-week course will provide the participant with a good understanding of the complex picture of health challenges globally in general and in deprived, vulnerable settings in particular. Tropical Medicine and Clinical Decision Making (three months, Jan-March, English only) This part focuses on descriptive pathology, laboratory practices and clinical decision-making adapted to low-resource settings and tropical district hospitals. This specialised clinical course is primarily designed for medical doctors who have no or little professional experience in (low-resource) tropical settings, as well as for clinicians working or planning to work in non-tropical settings with travelers and migrants. It is possible to follow parts of the Postgraduate certificate programme in Tropical Medicine and International Health: - The Postgraduate certificate programme "Advanced Tropical Medicine and Challenges in International Health" combining the courses "Challenges in International Health" with the course "Tropical Medicine and Clinical Decision Making" - The course "Tropical Medicine and Clinical Decision Making" as stand-alone course.

This 13 week well-established programme, which is over 118 years old, gives an excellent grounding in tropical medicine and public health for low resource settings. Brief course description	The Diploma in Tropical Medicine & Hygiene (DTM&H) is an intensive, three-month, full-time course in tropical medicine and public health for physicians. The course aims to teach doctors the skills required to understand, diagnose, treat and prevent diseases that are especially prevalent in tropical and developing countries where resources may be limited. The course has a strong epidemiological base but the scientific basis of infectious diseases is also given priority. A particular feature of the course is the diversity of students who attend. Among the 70 students who take the diploma course each year, more than 25 different countries are usually represented. Students range in experience from recently qualified doctors (though usually no earlier than 3 years post-graduation) to specialist infectious disease physicians and surgeons with many years of experience working in tropical and developing countries. The course is continually updated in response to changing needs, new developments in knowledge and technology, and student feedback. It has remained highly popular with students throughout its history which spans over 100 years. Brief course description	This ASTMH-accredited Diploma Course prepares health professionals to diagnose, manage, and prevent tropical diseases through a hybrid curriculum covering the full CTropMed Examination Content Outline. The online portion combines recorded lectures, live online instruction, required reading, and CTropMed-style assessments delivered through a mastery-based platform: students progress sequentially, unlocking each unit only after meeting completion thresholds of at least 80% video viewing and a quiz score of at least 80%. Students work at their own pace and have up to twelve months to complete the online portion, but the curriculum is paced around scheduled faculty engagement: a live case lecture at the end of Month 1, a Capstone Case discussion in Month 5, a Capstone review in Month 7, a live online Domain V module, faculty office hours by appointment, and up to two additional live web calls per student. The course concludes with a mandatory four-week in-person intensive in Suriname. The four-week in-person component comprises three weeks of intensive laboratory and clinical training in Paramaribo, followed by one week of field immersion alongside indigenous and tribal populations in Suriname's Amazon rainforest interior. The Paramaribo phase includes approximately 40 hours of hands-on laboratory training in malaria diagnosis (microscopy of thick and thin blood smears, species identification, parasite quantification), stool parasitology, dermatology diagnostics, and arbovirus serology, alongside afternoon lectures and clinical rounds at s' Lands Hospitaal, the oldest hospital in Suriname, founded in 1760, along with other teaching hospitals in Paramaribo. The field excursion places students in Medical Mission clinics serving indigenous Amerindian and Maroon tribal populations, with a one-day visit to a Malaria Service Deliverer post at an artisanal gold-mining site in the rainforest interior, providing direct exposure to health care delivery in some of the most resource-limited environments in the Western Hemisphere. Faculty include physicians and senior laboratory scientists with decades of clinical and research experience in tropical infectious diseases, drawn from Suriname's Centraal Laboratorium, Bureau of Public Health, Malaria Programma, Medische Zending, and the Dermatology Service. The course is open to MDs, senior medical students with completed core clinical rotations, physician assistants, nurse practitioners, and public health professionals.

The four-week in-person component provides hands-on clinical tropical medicine experience in an endemic setting and contributes toward the two months of clinical tropical medicine experience required for CTropMed® eligibility. Brief course description	The Nagasaki Diploma in Tropical Medicine and Hygiene (DTM&H) is an 11-week, full time taught course in Nagasaki and the Philippines (subject to travel restrictions). It is the only DTM&H course in Japan. The course is taught by lecturers from Japan, UK, and other countries who have clinical as well as research experience in tropical diseases. Brief course description	This course is only open to UVA residents in the Global Health Leadership Track and to Infectious Disease fellows. The course includes two 2-week didactic courses (Tropical Medicine and Global Health Policy and Practice), one 2-week rotation with refugee and vulnerable populations and a 2-week laboratory experience. A monthly lecture series on International Health, a weekly Infectious Disease lecture series, and a monthly telemedicine case conference with our colleagues in Uganda extend over two years. Trainees are required to complete either the two didactic courses or the Fellows Conference Series and then can choose from among the other course components.	This course is designed to provide training in tropical medicine and global public health issues through a multidisciplinary approach to disease. Traveler's health is covered in detail as well.
